

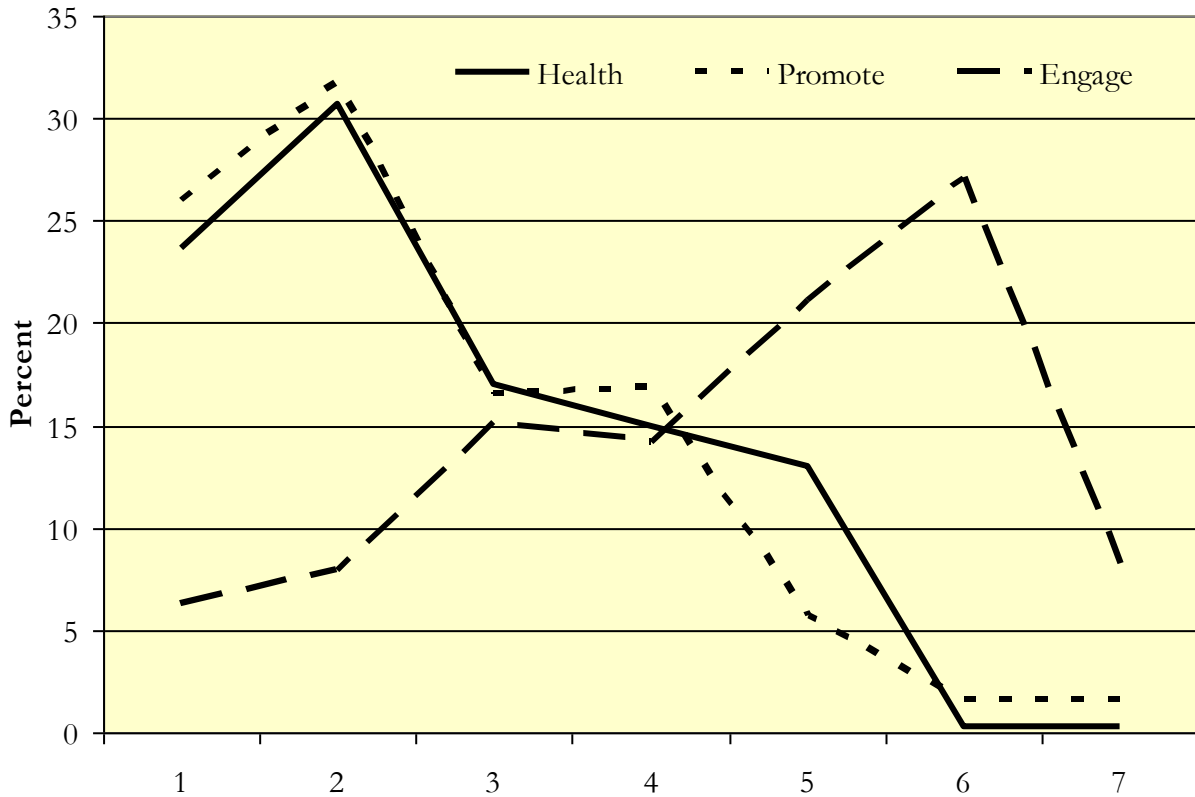

(1) The HEALTH of the church is fundamentally tied to the health of democracy.

(1) PROMOTING democracy is essential to God's plan for us

(1) The church must be ENGAGED in public affairs to remain true to its mission

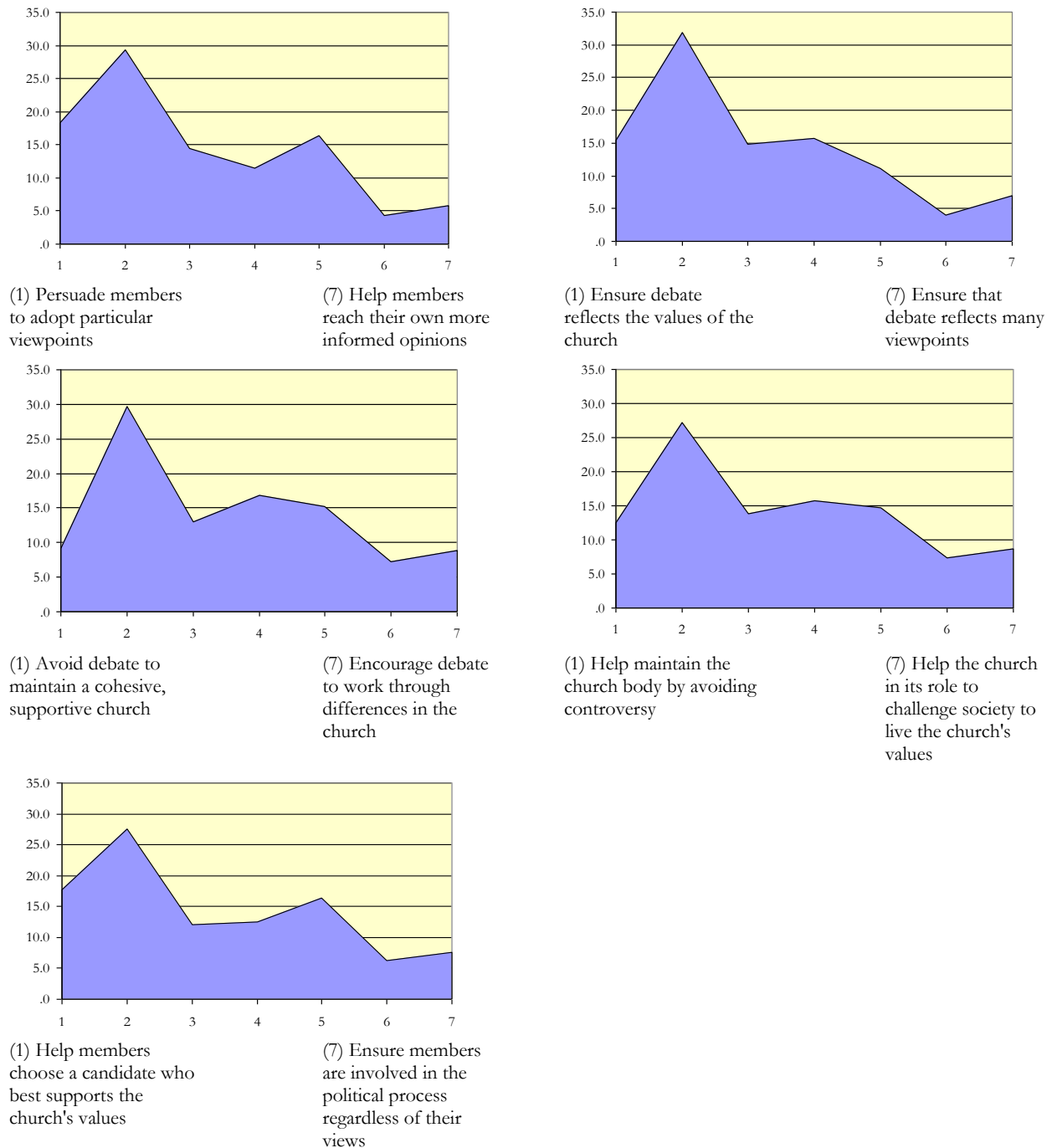
(7) The church exists apart from any government, democracy or not

(7) God and the church have no stake in a governmental system
